One of my favorite stories is set in a concentration camp. A prisoner is saved from the living death of the work camps, by being placed not among the ranks of the physical laborers, but in the kitchen, serving the officers. Because he emptied the trash, he had access to small bits of bread, fruit, meat, which he secreted back to the barracks, and carefully shared with the other souls there, at the risk of his life. A prisoner, an agnostic, asked him *why* he was doing this instead of keeping it for himself. The man answered: “Because I believe in God.” After the war, the man became a believer, because, he said: “I wanted to have what *that* man had!”

It is my firm belief that our greatest happiness is found in loving God, seeking to do His will in our actions and in our speech. It is found in not turning our backs on our neighbor or our world, all who cry out for life, justice, and peace. It is the only path for life which God has commanded us to follow. What else has God placed us here for, if we are fortunate enough to believe?

Our people here at St. John’s are blessed in that many are willing to try to seek the justice and joy of the Kingdom of God, and to accept God’s will to reign over them. Jesus Himself said if we would seek that *first*, “everything else that we truly need would be given us, besides.”

May this Annual Report and prayerful reflection inspire you to see an expanded role for you and your family in our parish community.

Report from our Pastoral Council

On behalf of the 2020-2021 Pastoral Council, we are pleased to present St. John the Evangelist Catholic Church *Annual Report to the Parish*. As a body that represents the parish community to provide advice to our pastor, other clergy, and staff, we continued an intense Pastoral Planning Process, with the support of an Archdiocesan Facilitator, and undaunted by the challenges of the pandemic. The Pastoral Council and key Parish leaders spent 18 months analyzing what makes this Parish unique and wonderful, what makes us proud of who we are as a parish, and where we can improve. We followed that with a plan for improvement. The implementation of that plan begins in September 2021 with our Renewal/Revival kickoff event. Meanwhile, the parish has been successful in beginning to implement the identified improvements.

This *Annual Report* contains highlights of accomplishments over the past year, which include:

- Continued celebration of the Mass and the Eucharist, adjusting to pandemic health and safety conditions
- Established a Senior Alliance Ministry, with outreach to Senior parishioners to combat pandemic isolation
- Adjusted and streamlined the number and schedule of Masses to meet our parishioners’ needs
- Initiated a Racial Justice Committee
- Integrated more worship opportunities including both our English and Spanish speaking communities; supported instantaneous translation
- Established a parish Communications Team; created a Communications Director position
- Realigned Parish Manager responsibilities to include administration, in addition to budget
- Sponsored information and discussion sessions to support parishioners’ understanding of and planning for hospice and palliative care

SJERC Pastoral Planning

St. John launched prayerfully into our parish Pastoral Planning. This is a process through which we will consider the spiritual needs and goals of our church, and identify the path we will travel as we live and share the Word of God. We will build on the work that was done this past year (2020-2021), and continue through discernment, refinement and implementation over the coming years.

Our Vision

St. John's intentionally brings diverse communities together.
Through our prayers and Liturgy, active engagement,
expanded service for the underserved, and purposeful action against injustice,
we imitate Jesus Christ by creating a welcoming environment for all.

Our Sacred Purpose (Mission)

To celebrate the joy in loving / following Christ by welcoming and loving all,
so that all are inspired to put faith into action and respond to the call to serve others.

The planning team began meeting in November 2019. The team consisted of Father Gerry, some Pastoral Council members, some parish staff, and other key parishioners. The Pastoral Planning Team participated in a Sacred Purpose workshop, where they shared stories of when they were most proud to be a member of St. John, and why and how the parish serves others. Themes from these stories included connection, support, comfort, listening and care, as well as inspiration and teaching. The team then looked at the community demographics and the current state of the parish. They noted a decline in attendance for the English language Masses, while the Spanish language Masses are always well-attended. Sunday is not a day of rest for many people, and some do not understand the relevance of their parish and their faith in God. St. John needs to help people translate this into their daily lives.

The pandemic slowed the progress of the planning team. The team met virtually to discuss the core mission priorities of Liturgy and Welcome, then stepped back to address the needs of the virtual Masses and safely bringing people back to Mass to worship in person. A few additional people were added to the Pastoral Planning team in Fall 2020, and the team resumed planning in January 2021.

2. Outreach to untapped groups in the parish and the community will ensure that the diversity and unity of the community will continue.
3. Intentionally leverage the connections made through ministry activities, celebrations and formation events by following up with participants and minister them to help them deepen their faith.
4. The mission of the church requires all of the gifts of the baptized. The parish wants to call forth these gifts and engage all in the ownership of evangelization efforts of the parish.

SJERC Ministries: Highlights 2020-2021

- **Racial Justice Committee, Gift of Peace Ministry, and the Diversity & Inclusion Ministry** hosted two listening sessions focused on learning the barriers that communities of color face accessing serious illness and end-of-life services. In partnership with Horizon Foundation and facilitated by the Hospice & Palliative Care Network of Maryland, feedback from the discussions will shape and design future information sessions and educational resources to share broadly with our faith community. Seven local community groups collaboratively hosted the listening sessions: SJERC, Accessible Resources for Independence, Aging Adult Services, Chinese American Parent Association of Howard County, Indian Cultural Association of Howard County, Korean American Senior Association, and This Point Forward.
- **Food Bank Ministry** collected 38,400 items of donated food and hygiene products for distribution by Columbia Community Care between June 2020 and June 2021. Thanks to the generosity of parishioners of St. John Catholic Church and St. John United Church, many local families were helped this year. SJERC and Archdiocese of Baltimore volunteers with SJERC also distributed 2,580 U.S. Department of Agriculture food boxes (78,690 pounds of food) between January and May 2021.
- **Social Justice Ministry** conducted strategic planning and visioning, seeking to discern areas in the community where we are being called to service and advocacy. The ministry held virtual meetings with parishioners to provide information and opportunities, and supported the work of its subcommittees and task forces.
- **Interfaith Hospitality Center** found creative alternatives to our traditional in-person dinners, necessitated by the pandemic. Four special drive-by distribution events were held. Budget-friendly cookbooks in English and Spanish, along with ingredients for one recipe and face masks, were distributed in August. In December, Santa and our volunteers greeted families and distributed ingredients for chocolate chip cookies, with small gifts and gift cards, to 103 families with 338 children, and 13 adults without children. At the St. Valentine's Day drive-by, the Interfaith Hospitality Center distributed ingredients to make soup and muffins along with face masks, chocolate, a resource packet, and homemade cards. The Spring event included ingredients for a pasta dish and dessert as well as other goodies.
- **Senior Alliance Committee** volunteers connected with parishioners age 65+ to help combat our prolonged social isolation and physical separation from the Mass and Holy Eucharist during the pandemic. Twenty-four parishioners sent Christmas cards to 1,400 seniors, and then followed-up with phone calls (January-March) for uplifting conversations and to help them stay spiritually connected to our church family during COVID.
- **Gift of Peace Ministry** developed an instructional video to help families think through their preferences for care, talk about that with loved ones, and name their health care agent. Videos of end-of-life workshops featuring clergy, lawyers, hospice workers and funeral directors are available on the website and in the WLIFC Library.
- **Beechfield Elementary-Middle School** program assisted with funds for materials for students, school supplies, and books for the school's literacy night. Several school families dealing with food insecurity received food and gifts packed by the Interfaith Hospitality Team and donated by St. John parishioners.

- **Green Team**
engaged in activities related to environmental challenges including climate change. We expanded our work with other faith communities on environmental justice issues. We rejuvenated and maintained the WLIFC rain garden, stenciled storm drains, co-hosted an online viewing of the film “The Story of Plastic” with a panel discussion, held a “Plastic Fast” during Lent with weekly tips to reduce use of plastics, held a *Laudato Si* Study Group, supported other congregations in neighborhood clean-ups, and worked with the WLIFC Board on ways to “green up” our facility.
- **Sister Parish Ministry**
between St. John and St. Bernardine Church in Baltimore was very active, and included partnering with the **Social Justice Ministry**. A survey on social justice issues was developed and administered to parishioners. Our virtual book club focused on social justice issues and conversations. Parishioners participated in a virtual prayer service and peace walk on Martin Luther King Day. We also discussed incorporating social justice issues into the liturgy working with our Pastors and the **Liturgical Committee** to bring out the message of the gospel in relation to the current times.
- **Sister Parish Ministry**
led the coordinated St. John-St. Bernardine celebration of Black Catholic History Month in November 2020, developing and sharing information with parishioners on holy women and men of color who are in the canonization process. We prayed for their canonization at Sunday and weekday Masses, and at home.
- **Hispanic Ministry**
guides 10 to 15 Spanish-speaking members of our congregation every year to faithfully participate in the parish’s program of sacramental formation for adults — Baptism, Communion, and Confirmation.
- **Music Ministry**
continued to enrich our worship services through uplifting and inspirational musical liturgy. As the pandemic situation evolved, the Music Ministry adapted through recorded and live praise, alternatively virtual and in-person.
- **Prison Ministry - Prison Reform and Advocacy Team**
increased awareness, education and advocacy on relevant issues by regular communications with parishioners, sponsorship of restorative justice expert speakers and training, and partnership with the Maryland Alliance for Justice Reform. Prison Ministry also collaborated with Resurrection, Relay and St. Bernardine parishes.
- **Religious Education Ministry (Grades K-6)**
provided Catholic faith education to 278 children supported by 50 catechists and aids. Our *Be My Disciple* program uses reflections on Scripture and doctrine. Classes were offered in both Spanish and English, and included the option of a facilitated virtual family-based program for children who could not participate in the weekly zoom classes.
- **Youth (7th-12th Grades) and Young Adult Ministry**
continued to offer faith formation to over 80 young people in both English and Spanish with virtual meetings, as well as thought provoking topics and reflection videos and messages shared through email and on St. John’s website.
- **Boy Scouts of America Troop 649**
earned the prestigious Pope Paul VI National Catholic Unit Award. The troop is chartered by St. John and coordinates our parish’s annual Scout Sunday Mass, annual International Peace Light ceremony, and supports Green Team and Social Ministry activities while teaching young men to honor their “Duty to God” among other core scout values.

As you are aware, SJERC needs adequate financial resources to fulfill our mission, to maintain our facilities, systems and equipment, and care for our staff. During the fiscal year completed on June 30, 2021, we continued to navigate through the challenges of the pandemic, not only impacting our financial well-being with the cessation of in-person Masses, but the well-being of our human resources—staff, volunteers and parishioners as well. Your generosity and support have sustained this wonderful community of faith. As you will see in the accompanying reports below, we ended the year in good financial condition.


Although our overall operating income was down by \$157,775 compared to last year, we were able to manage the expenses of the parish, resulting in only a small operating loss of \$5,712. You will note that the loss was more than offset by non-operating income that includes our share of funds collected by the Archdiocese of Baltimore through diocesan-wide campaigns, which you generously supported as well. The majority of the non-operating income is a result of the Archdiocese of Baltimore reimbursing the parish for its portion of the Embracing the Mission campaign, based on pledge payments made by our parishioners. As the campaign comes to a close after five years, the remaining payments to the parish will continue to decline. Thank you to all who assisted the work of the Archdiocese and assisted SJERC in putting aside needed financial resources for the future of our parish. These funds will greatly assist in our budgeting in the coming years. A final note in summary, when this non-operating income is combined with the small operating loss, our financial condition is significantly improved, as our total income exceeds total expenses by \$687,541.

KEY TAKEAWAYS FROM SJERC FINANCIAL REPORT


- As a result of the pandemic, there is a significant increase in individuals utilizing the electronic funds transfer (EFT) program (Give Central and ParishSoft Online Giving). Although our offertory income was down about \$80,200 overall, as compared to last year, contributions through EFT increased by over \$172,700 to almost \$748,000. The amounts contributed in both envelope and EFT represent just over 70% of our total operating income. Loose cash or checks dropped in the collection basket account for another 13%.
- All other sources of income in total account for a little less than 17% of total operating income.
- As with many organizations, particularly not-for-profit, a significant portion (64%) of our operating budget is dedicated to labor costs (24%) and benefits (11%) as well as facilities (29%). Another 18% is remitted to the Archdiocese for its operational support and for support of Catholic schools. With only 18% of the operational revenues remaining to cover all other expenses, the essential role volunteers play in the work of the parish and the delivery of programming is clear and vital. We will continue to look for creative and productive ways, with limited resources available, to expand programming in the future to meet the needs of existing parishioners and to attract new members to this faith-filled and diverse community. All are welcome!

Income and Expense Category Definitions

- ◆ **Income-Special:** funds collected as part of the second collections during in-person Masses. (one of four earmarked second collections that rotate throughout the monthly collections.) The specific purpose changes throughout the year.
- ◆ **Income-Capital:** funds collected as part of the second collections during Masses. (one of the four that rotate)
- ◆ **Expenses-Worship:** expenditure related to liturgical supplies and costs needed to put on Masses and events.
- ◆ **Expenses-Diocesan, Charity, and Poor Box:** expenditure of funds collected as part of the second collections during Masses.
- ◆ **Expenses-Programs:** expenditure incurred to run the various ministries (e.g., Music Ministry, Youth Ministry, etc.).
